

Creating a User Account

In this tutorial, we will show you how to create a new user account on the iSENSE website.

Registering

From anywhere within the iSense website, you can go to the top right hand corner of the page and click on the “Register” button. This will take you to a page where you can fill out all of your account information, such as your name, email address, and the password you want. Be sure to check the button at the bottom to prove that you’re not a robot (unless, of course you are a robot, in which case, you shouldn’t be making an account in the first place). Finally, click the blue “Create User” button at the bottom of the page. Congratulations! You have just created an iSENSE account.

Changing Your Account Information

If at any time you want to change your account information, look to the column on the left hand side of the account page. Change your display name by clicking on the little paper and pencil symbol next to your current display name, retyping your name, and then clicking the green save button. To change your email or password, click on the link beneath your current email. This will bring you to a page where you can change either your username, password, or both! You can also add a short biography to your page if you desire by clicking the large green plus sign under the “Bio” section, adding in any text, links, images, or videos you want, and then clicking save. To access your account page at any time, simply click on your display name in the top right hand corner of the page.

Logging Out

To logout of your account, click on the “Logout” button at the top right hand corner of the page, and you will be logged out of your account.

Logging In

To log back into your account, simply click the “Login” button at the top right hand corner of the page, fill in your password and email, and then click the blue “Login” button in the bottom. It’s as easy as that.
